## **ARTICLES** Wisconsin Alliance Cluster Update 3/21/23

On Tuesday, March 20<sup>th</sup> representatives from six churches gathered (some online) and had a great discussion on some of the most pressing concerns of our churches. Read on to find out how we hope to address these challenges and strengthen each other.

First, we discussed the reality of most of our churches. I shared the disturbing data that




churches in the US on average have declined over the past 20 years from 137 to 65 in attendance. **We acknowledged that all our churches are on the** 

latter half of the "Church

Lifecycle," meaning our churches are in the mature, empty nest, retired, aging, or dying stage. We have felt the challenges of declining participation.

We then considered Jesus' words to Peter in Matt. 16:18; "*And I tell you that you are Peter, and on this* 



rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not overcome it." Jesus

promised to build/strengthen His Church. He is the true Rock we stand on and He will enable us to bear fruit.

While we trust Jesus to work through us, there is still an urgent call for us to strengthen our brothers in Christ (Luke 22:32, 2 Cor. 12:19). I love Brian Thorstan's nudge to the Church, *"I don't understand having a lackadaisical attitude toward the survival of a church. Any church. There's too much at stake. What could matter more than... the salvation of lost people and the glory of God?"* 

With that discussion we moved on to consider the needs and challenges our churches are facing. They included...

- How do we grow our congregation?
- How can we reach young families and help kids hold on to faith? (How do we prepare for and attract families? How do we deal with time demands of sports? How do we face progressive ideology?)
- How should we navigate educational options and differing opinions? (Some continued discussion after the meeting acknowledged the increased enrollment in Christian schools in Oostburg, Sheboygan, and Waupun, while Wisconsin Rapids is seeing an increase in homeschooling.)
- How should we train, elect, and empower elders to lead and care for the church?
- How do we better collaborate and connect as churches?
- How should we welcome, connect, and teach new members?

#### The gathering concluded with some import decisions, including...

We agreed to meet quarterly to address "best practices" in facing the above challenges. We hope to learn from each other and utilize others in the Alliance to find great solutions.

We also officially formed a Wisconsin cluster and elected a Cluster Leader. I am honored to serve in that role and help us strengthen our churches.
