How Do You Sort Through Tough Ethical Questions? (Part 8 of Pathways to Maturity)

Ethics are really complicated today. Well, they've been complicated for a long time. Determining and then living according to a set of moral principles is hotly debated in our culture.

Recently, a complicated situation made waves in the Christian world. Pastor Alistair Begg was removed from 180 radio stations under American Family Association for advising a grandmother to attend her grandson's transgender wedding if she had communicated that she disagreed with his view on gender and marriage.

The Bible is clear that marriage is for a man and a woman (Genesis 1:27, 2:24; Matt. 5:27-32, 19:1-12; Mark 10:6-8; 1 Cor. 7:1-7). Attending a ceremony certainly implies support and Warren Smith makes a strong argument in support of the AFA actions (<a href="https://ministrywatch.com/editors-notebook-alistair-begg-made-a-mistake/">https://ministrywatch.com/editors-notebook-alistair-begg-made-a-mistake/</a>). He has no tolerance for Christians participating in such a ceremony.

Interestingly, Focus on the Family, while agreeing with Biblical marriage, suggests this may be a disputable issue (Rom. 14). (<a href="https://www.focusonthefamily.com/family-">https://www.focusonthefamily.com/family-</a>

Some of you remember the days where the pastor would ask if anyone objects to the marriage they should speak up. This provided some great drama for Hollywood weddings. However, this practice disappeared a while back. I still have the family and congregation take a vow to support the couple, which I certainly would not stand up for in an unbiblical marriage ceremony.

# (To the family-standing)

Will you receive \_\_\_\_ and \_\_\_\_ into your family and do everything in your power to uphold and care for them as they establish themselves as a family within your own. **We will.** 

### (To all present-standing)

Will you who witness this covenant between \_\_\_ and \_\_\_ respect their marriage, pray for them and sustain them with your friendship and care? **We will.** 

Also, note that the Alliance of Reformed Churches requires the affirmation of the Great Lakes Catechism of Marriage and Sexuality (<a href="https://arc21.org/creeds-confessions">https://arc21.org/creeds-confessions</a>) for all pastors, elders and deacons. Performing same-sex marriages in th Alliance is not permitted.

In the end, it's clear attending a homosexual wedding is a difficult moral question. It is also clear that Christians must understand the principles taught in the Bible to determine what they should do. This is where the rubber hits the road. As part of ordination (and Christian maturity for all believers), we not only need to know the Old Testament, the New Testament, and how to interpret the Bible, but we must apply the principles to today's difficult questions.

## Let me throw some other ethical questions at you...

- Can Christians get tattoos?
- Should Christians be cremated?
- Should Christians attend a wedding of a couple that is living together?

- Should churches only sing psalms?
- Should churches allow for leaders who are divorced?
- Does the second commandment prohibit art in church?
- Is it permissible to work on Sunday?
- Should women be lead pastors?

Do you have biblical answers to these? Having a conviction or an opinion is not sufficient! Spiritual maturity is having solid biblical answers to difficult questions.

Spiritual maturity is also having the courage to act on those convictions. In 1 Samuel 2, we see a terrible failure of a religious leader. Eli is still the head priest, but he has turned a blind eye to his son's desecration of the temple. Eli, Hophni and Phinehas die for their sins and God replaces them with a faithful leader. Samuel rises up to be a godly man who led Israel back to their God.

What about you? Do you know biblical ethics? Are you living biblical ethics?

**PRAYER:** Lord, help us discern your truth, listen to your Spirit, confess sin, and live rightly in our world. Give us wisdom to know what is right and the courage to do what is right. Amen.

## **Update from Consistory:**

- The Consistory approved the affirmation of Randy McDaniel and Ian Van Wyk
  for the Ministry Ordination Pathway through the Alliance of Reformed
  Churches. This does not mean they are ordained but that Alto Reformed
  Church supports them beginning this process.
- Keith Twigg from Slingshot Group is reposting the Associate Pastor position and is feeling positive about applicants.

- The Consistory approved the Equipping Youth Director job description recommended by the Exec Team. The job has been posted.
- The Consistory decided to continue sending children to Camp Manitoqua this
  year but the Equipping Children & Families Team will look into the possibility
  of other options for the future.

#### Alliance Update from Seth Sundstrom

"We believe the church's faithful witness to Jesus is the hope of the world."

Dear friends,

On January 11 and 12 the Alliance Board of Directors met in Sioux Falls for an inperson meeting. Prior to that, in the Fall of 2023, we had communicated our desire to search for and hire a CEO to accomplish the mission of the Alliance moving into the future. After many hours of discussion, prayer and discernment, the Board has decided to press pause on that process. Instead, the Board has committed to a 12-month plan of collectively doing the work that a CEO would have done, acting as a hands-on management board for 2024. Each Board member has committed to playing an active part in this plan through the end of 2024.

#### **Board Transition, Extended Terms, and Officers**

In the last six months, we have added several new Board members as Alliance Networks have become more self-sufficient and been ready to nominate someone to serve the Alliance. Jeff Elzinga (Harvest), Ron Fischer (At-Large) and Craig Gilbert (Michigan Catalyst) began serving in July 2023 and we recently welcomed Lee Vande Voort (Upper MIssissippi Valley) to the Board. With these additions and with our work this year as a management-focused Board, the new Board Members requested that Joel Baar (Launch Board Member), Jamie Dykstra (Launch Board Member), and Seth Sundstrom (Interim Board Member) stay on the Board through December 2024 rather than ending their term in June. Joel, Jamie, and Seth have agreed to this, which will be a great help for board transition and for the work before us. Jamie Dykstra was elected as President, Jeff Elzinga as Vice President, and Lee Vande Voort as Secretary. Ron Fischer remains as Treasurer. Joel Baar will serve as immediate Past President for 2024.

### Restated "Why" for the Alliance

As part of our recent in-person Board meeting in Sioux Falls, we spent time focusing on the "Why" for the Alliance. Why does the Alliance exist? Jesus. Jesus is the hope

of the world. The church is how Christ has chosen for that hope to be shared with the world. Our collective testimony as his church and as The Alliance is powerful and effective when that witness is lived out faithfully. So, why does the Alliance exist?

Or stated another way, the Board believes our organization exists to be an alliance of Christ-centered Reformed churches seeking to faithfully fulfill the Great Commission. The Board believes the Networks of the Alliance are one of our greatest strengths for equipping churches to witness to Jesus.

The above Why statement (in quotes) will inform the Board's approach to the What (what we will do) and the How (how we will do it). Each of these elements will be aligned with The Alliance's Unifying Beliefs – the document currently being circulated and refined within The Alliance, and which will become the successor to our original Organizational Convictions statement.

#### What's Next?

The Board will continue meeting the first and third Tuesdays of each month, mostly by Zoom. We anticipate another in-person Board meeting later this year. We will dig into collectively serving as the "Interim CEO" for this year, while also intentionally transitioning over time to a policy governance board. Our approach will be to focus on "ends" – the results we discern that God would like to see from the Alliance as a whole – which will inform the specific decisions and actions needed to achieve those ends. Over the next few weeks we will continue discerning how to operationalize our hands-on management priority for this year, and effectively deploy our Alliance staff to help fulfill the vision.
