Deeper Thoughts on Elyssa's Song

Just a couple weeks ago, Elyssa, my youngest, <u>sang a song</u> she wrote with some help from her brothers after hearing <u>Jean Stelsel share her testimony</u> at youth group. Jean has an inspiring story of faith in the midst of a severe battle with COVID and now with cancer. Elyssa took that message and shared a song with an interesting twist to the ever challenging moment of what to say when someone is dying.

I've been at the bedside of many people as they struggled to stay in this world. Most recently, it was Arlene, a sweet, faithful follower of Jesus. I've prayed many times with her and for her to be strengthened that she might continue to serve God by blessing others in her care facility and her family. Those prayers quickly changed to prayers for God to take her home and to end her suffering here.

For many of us, death is a joy we look forward to. When life is hard, death

seems pretty appealing.

A few years ago, Libbi, a high school student at the time shared her testimony and the challenges she had faced in life. I will not forget her words, "It's harder to live than die." As I recall, this was not so much a looking at the joy of heaven, but that even with a completely unknown future, that seemed more appealing than the trials of life.

While we rightly pray for God to take some home in the midst of their suffering, we can not lose sight of the God who is far bigger than our suffering. I love that Elyssa's song is not so much a message of faithful believers praying for healing as it is God speaking into Jean; calling her to persevere. Here's the lyrics to the chorus and bridge...

You said come alive
And open your eyes
You said come O breath
And live again
Come and stand on your feet
And praise the one who gives us peace
And with the breath of Your spirit, Come alive

It's not time to go; It's not to leave; God wants you here; God wants you here

APPLICATION:

As you consider your life, your busyness, your boredom, your stress, your pain, your conflicts, your loss, your weariness, your sin, your indulging, and your every decision... God wants you here. It's not time to give up. It's not time to go home. It is time to stand on your feet; to praise the one who gives us peace.

This reminds me of Paul's challenge as he sat in prison in Rome, aging and weary of life, yet filled with the joy of Christ. He wrote this to the church in Philippi.

...Christ will be exalted in my body, whether I live or die. 21 For to me, living is Christ and dying is gain. 22 Now if I am to go on living in the body, this will mean productive work for me, yet I don't know which I prefer: 23 I feel torn between the two because I have a desire to depart and be with Christ, which is

better by far, 24 but it is more vital for your sake that I remain in the body. 25 And since I am sure of this, I know that I will remain and continue with all of you for the sake of your progress and joy in the faith... (Philippians 1:20-25 NET)

So, whether you're 98 or 9, God's got you here for a reason. You can run your own way or you can join Paul in living for Christ working productively to see others progress in their faith. Let this passage and this song be an encouragement to push forward in faith!

Pray: Lord, help me keep my eyes on the goal, not just to attain heaven, but to bring as many people with me as I possibly can. Help me live in a manner worthy of the gospel and walk in your joy! AMEN.

What just happened at the top of the Alliance?

The Alliance Board has decided to move away from the dual leadership model they established to launch the denomination. Dan Ackerman will be stepping aside. Tim Vink will continue in his role and Dale Ringerwole will be stepping into a new CEO position.

Why would Marty and I skip the Alto Fair in 2023?

It really is with much consternation we have decided to head to Denver for the first Alliance Gathering. Unfortunately, they scheduled it right on top of the Alto Fair. There are several reasons I'm going, but I'll share two here...

1. Establishing a healthy network of churches to guard the mission, purity, and unity of the church is essential to kingdom work and our local church. George Peters noted, "The independence of the local church is beautifully balanced by the interdependence of the churches . . . Indeed, no one liveth to himself, not even the local church. There is strength in the proper mobilization and coordination of our interdependence which results in unity of purpose and action. This needs to be emphasized again and again..." (Biblical Theology of Missions, 225). Dave Harvey has written a fabulous book on our need for this kind of collaboration, it's titled Stronger Together: Seven Partnership Virtues and the Vices That Subvert Them (Grand Rapids, MI: Zondervan, 2023). 2. Apathy will destroy our partnership. Apathy of conservatives in the RCA is killing it. Seven years ago, when I came to Alto, I was coming from a long season of church planting. I heard of the division in the RCA, but had complete trust in the 75% conservative majority to hold our ground on issues like universalism and marriage. I soon watched the failure to get two-thirds of the classes to support marriage being between one man and one woman. The slide escalated from there, and my apathy regarding denominational involvement shifted.

The PCA has held its ground lately, but they have met resistance even with their clear conservative views. Jim Shaw of the PCA recently wrote "How to Kill a Denomination in One Easy Move." What is the move? Don't send reps to their General Assembly. He writes "Therefore, watch over her and maintain her good health. Send your pastor to do the unpleasant work of maintaining the denomination that you love. Ruling elders, take from your time and treasure to protect the denomination that you love. Don't regret to one day see your church lying lifeless on the field of battle, a casualty to your false security and casualness." As you are enjoying the fair, I ask that you keep those of us in Denver in prayer.

Huge shift happening with ordination!

I've been blessed to be part of the Global Alliance Ordination Team from the start. Much of this has been easy transfers of well trained, experienced RCA ordained pastors. However, we have also realized we needed more clarity on what we should expect of pastors who are young and sensing a call into ministry.

Dr. Nathan Hitchcock has earned my greatest respect and appreciation for his efforts in leading a team to create clear competencies for pastors. Some of these are "core," meaning they are essential for every pastor to have before they step into a position. There are then another 144 competencies to work toward in the coming years.

I love that there is a good balance between the head, heart and hand competencies. There is a huge need for knowledge, character, and practical

skills our future leaders need, and the Alliance Pathways is looking to hit them all well.

There is a lot more going on with this ,so if you are sensing a call to ministry or know some one who is, have them contact me for more information.

Should We Partner with the Upper Mississippi Valley Network?

Yes, we just joined the Dakota Network, which may be renamed very soon, but so have many others. The latest count I've heard is 74 churches in the Dakota Network and more are coming. Several of these are in eastern lowa and western Illinois. They are creating a cluster or three, and planning to form a network in the near future. I, Kevin, have had a couple conversations with them and look forward to sorting through this possibility.

What's the staffing plan for Alto?

The Executive team has met several times in the past month to consider possible positions, the vision discussions of the consistory, and options for help. The consistory has overwhelmingly sensed a call to raise up the next generation. This includes continuing to reach and disciple our children and youth, and increasing our efforts to reach and disciple young adults and families. After reviewing the current hiring conditions, the consistory approved a recommendation from the Exec Team to hire Slingshot Group to help us in the discernment and search process. We will share more information as we move into this relationship.
