Fall on a Sword - Bible Trivia

You've maybe heard a story like this about a guy who really needed to hear from God, so he opened his Bible and read... "Saul took his own sword and fell on it. ⁵ When the armor-bearer saw that Saul was dead, he too fell on his sword and died with him. (1 Sa 31:4–5.)" Confused as to what God was saying to him he flipped to another page and read... "Go and do likewise." (Luke 10:37). So, he did.

This is bad Bible interpretation. Well, it's terrible!

However, the reality is that all of us have done the same thing... randomly opening our Bible and expecting God to speak clear application to our situation.



Let's take another hypothetical situation...

A teenager struggling with lust reads, "If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away! It is better to lose one of your members than to have your whole body thrown into hell." Matthew 5:29 (NET 2nd ed.) In a moment of terror over the idea of going to hell, he plunges a screwdriver into his eye. (I've actually been to

the ER to see a teenage church member with a screwdriver in his eye. It was an accident, but gruesome in so many ways.)

Interpreting the Bible can be challenging as we are are easily blinded to the truth in Scripture by our culture and then do great damage to others. The abuses of the priest in Roman Catholic Churches a thousand years ago and more recently have crushed the faith of many. The abuse of slaves under the endorsement of pastors is a terrible blot on christian history. The overly zealous liberal churches blessing of sin certainly sabotages the message of grace with the removal of right or wrong.

So, what can you do to interpret the Bible rightly?

- 1. Know the whole Bible. Read the whole thing! (Read last months article for some helps with that.) Knowing the context of a specific verse will make a huge difference in how you understand and apply the passage. So, start reading through the whole Bible today.
- 2. Know how to study the Bible inductively. The most helpful practice I learned early in my walk was inductive Bible study. It's simple... Observe, Interpret, & Apply. One simply asks and answers three questions... What does the passage say? What did it mean? And what does it mean for me? Here's a great introduction ("How to Lead Bible Study") by Intervarsity.



3. Know who you can trust to interpret the Bible. In recent years, I've found it more and more important to know who I am reading or watching. Are they Christian? Baptist? Reformed? Progressive? Woke? Conservative? Knowing where they stand on major issues prepares me for what they may be trying to teach. So, know if you can really trust that video preacher or author.

This point also applies at a local level. Small groups are a great place to process interpretation and application. Your friends and family have your best in mind, and they should be willing to question your interpretation and help you walk in the truth.

You'll benefit in many ways from joining a small group, and we have several you could join. Call the office and let us know you are interested.
