Pathways to Maturity - Poop & Leadership

"Be diligent in these matters [watching your life, doctrine, and ministry]; give yourself wholly to them, so that everyone may see your progress." (1 Timothy 4:15 NIV)

In July's newsletter, I explained that I am thrilled to see the Alliance organize pathways toward ordination. I get that most of you have no desire to be ordained, but you should have a desire to be mature, and the pathways to pastoral ordination lays out the foundational competencies for ministry leadership really well. In the coming months, I will walk through the major areas of spiritual maturity outlined by the Alliance, so that you can take steps to progress toward maturity and become more like Christ.

In August, I covered Spiritual formation and now we will hit on **Leadership/Administration**.

The Alliance Pathway has 12 Leaders/Administration competencies to be "certified" in this area. There are three competencies to be ordained. (Anyone who is ordained in the Alliance is expected to have an intentional plan to complete the other competencies and be certified.)

The three core Leadership/Administration competencies might be

summarized as submission, tech, and strengths. These are the three essentials for any pastor. I'd say they are essential for elders, deacons, and church staff too. But they are also worth developing for everyone. Let's consider each one.

Submission and Servant Leadership:

I am learning submission. We've jumped into foster care with a desire to submit ourselves to Christ. For us that is owning the call in Scripture for us to care for the orphans and widows (James 1:27). It also involves a surrendering to the Spirit's nudge and a call to us to step up and take in some kids.

At a practical level this is harder than we imagined (and more rewarding). Ladies, don't mock me for this... but this morning, Stephanie was discipling a couple ladies on Zoom and I was left to get our adorable 4yr old and 14month old going. I had to resist my to-do list and just focus on giving kids attention. Now, I love this time, yet everything in me says "go, get work done." So that was hard enough, but then the diaper started to smell. I hate diapers. No really, my stomach churns and I nearly toss my cookies. But, I submitted to Christ and served my wife (who does nearly all the diaper changing) and changed that diaper. I gagged a bit, but learned a bit more about truly having a servantheart, as well.

Consider some of the questions from the Alliance Pathways on submission...

- 1. Do you submit to Jesus Christ? What are some specific ways you have submitted (or are submitting) to His almighty will in your life?
- Do you submit to those in positional authority over oneself? What are some specific ways you have submitted to those who have a position of authority over you? Name at least two persons, including someone in ministry.
- 3. Do you submit to fellow Christians in mutual submission? What are some specific ways you have laid down your will to other Christians who do not necessarily have a claim to authority over you?

The Pathway gives this challenge... Devote four specific days to submission. For each day, concentrate on what it means to submit to a certain

person you will be with that day. Without telling the person, consider ways to submit to them. At least one of those days should be committed to submission to someone in positional authority over you (e.g., a boss, a parent) and one day someone who is not (e.g., a Christian in your care, a subordinate employee, a friend). Record what you learn about submission when you are actively, voluntarily submitting yourself to another person.

Office Technologies:

I love that this is a requirement for ordination, even though I feel more and more inept in this area. Software apps are changing constantly and they are never getting more simple. They add features and options, hiding the things you want behind three dots or some other stupid icon.

I confess, today, I wasted time trying to post a video on Facebook and finally had Megan, our office manager, come in and help. She quickly pointed me in the right direction and got it done. She says it worked, but I've not seen the post.

Tech can be incredibly frustrating, but if you want to have any influence or even a relationship with the next generation, you must use technology. So, show some humility and ask a kid to help you learn how to use your phone.

Stephanie's mom just learned to set up some text groups, so she can regularly text grandkids to pray for them. You can do this! Learn some new tech, so you can increase your influence and share the good news.

Awareness of Personality, Gifts, Strengths:

Exhibiting an awareness of one's own personality, spiritual gifts, and teamrelated strengths, is another essential for ministry. **If you don't know about yourself, you'll waste time doing things others can do better and faster.**

Fortunately for you, Alto Reformed Church has a fabulous tool for this. We've purchased surveys for you that cover all three of these areas, so it's free to you. Check it out at www.altoreformedchurch.org/discover-your-strengths.html. If you have already done these assessments, then dig into the results. AssessMe.org gives great insight into your specific personality, gifts and leadership style. It's not as painful as changing a poopy diaper - in my

opinion.

These three core competencies are good for pastors and good for you. So I urge you to learn something about submission, tech, and your strengths this month, so you can have a greater impact on your world.

PRAYER: Lord, help me grow as a leader. Remind me to serve others with humility, always submitting to your will. Help me understand technology and be willing to learn. Guide me in knowing who I am so I can serve most effectively for your kingdom. Amen.

Acts 4:12

Jesus promised rest (Matthew 11:28–30). Burdens are lifted at Calvary.

Jesus promised eternal life to those who trust Him (<u>John 4:14</u>). The Good Shepherd also promised to hold us securely: "No one will snatch them out of my hand" (<u>John 10:28</u>).

Jesus promised His disciples power from on high (<u>Acts 1:8</u>). In this power, they "turned the world upside down" (Acts 17:6).

Jesus promised that He will return for us (<u>John 14:2–3</u>). From then on, we will be with Him always.

Thank you to all those who sent cards and visited me but most of all for your prayers. A big thank you to those who helped me move. All was so much appreciated. God is good.


