Articles The State of Our Soul By Kevin Van Wyk

Soon our president will give a State of the Union address. I am sure he will celebrate the good things he has accomplished and boldly speak of what he intends to do in the coming years. Many other presidents will do the same thing for their organization or school. In fact, I've done this for the church some years.

As we move into 2019, I'd like to reflect on the state of the soul, particularly your soul. It's tempting to make some bold statements about the condition of American Christians, the decline of the church, and the political tension we live in. I could blame the democrats or Trump or the Superior Court for all the problems in our country, but that is a fruitless and destructive direction to go.

Instead let's take John Wesley's question to open up all his small groups: "How is it with your soul?" John knew how to go deep. He did not ask our common question: "How are you?" to which we expect and often get: "Fine." I'd like you to reflect quietly for a moment.

How is your soul?

What word comes to mind to describe your heart?

Do any of these resonate with you? Stressed, Bitter, Anxious, Conflicted, Numb, Weary, Disturbed, Irritable, Downcast or Depressed.

My guess is that it is not quite where you want it. Maybe it's severe and you are venturing into escapist behaviors like binge watching TV, drinking during the day, spending beyond your means, viewing pornography, or hiding behaviors. Maybe your soul is not quite so troubled, but you know it's not at peace. Regardless, we could all use some more peace and joy in our soul.

Jesus speaks this to us... "Come to me, all of you who are weary and carry heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you. Let me teach you, because I am humble and gentle at heart, and you will find rest for your souls" (Matthew 11:28– 29 NLT).

Sounds like a great invitation.

"Jesus, I'll take 2lbs of rest... make that 30lbs. What it's not for sale? I need to come, take your yoke, and learn???"

When Jesus says, "come," he infers a humble, repentant following. When he says, "take my yoke," he refers to God's mission to the world. And when he says, "let me teach you," he invites us to be an apprentice. **Bottom line:** rest comes from a daily walk with Jesus. A relationship where we listen, learn, and love.

Instagram Party Accounts

What they are: Middle school through college students are using Instagram to organize parties away from the eyes of concerned adults. Why you should know about them: Party organizers don't use their personal accounts to hype the event; instead, they create a brand-new, private account (something like @ChristmasPartyy2018). From there, hopeful party-goers who are approved to follow the account are allowed to attend the event (though more stringent rules—e.g. must follow the hosts' personal accounts-are often implemented). What's also interesting: Many of these parties never come to fruition, sometimes because the "hosts" are just looking to gain more followers. This whole thing reminds us that: 1. Teens still need wise, calm guidance; 2. There are always ways around restrictions, and our tech-savvy kids will find them; so 3. We can't stop having conversations with them (about exclusivity and how it impacts those who aren't deemed "worthy," the need for "followers," partying, etc.).

Missionary Update

Long Lay the World in Sin and Error Pining

My (Bob) favorite Christmas Carol is O Holy Night.... "Long lay the world in sin and error pining - Till He appeared and the soul felt its worth - A thrill of hope the weary world rejoices - For yonder breaks a new and glorious morn."

As we think of the ministry the Lord has called us to, we can't rid our minds of the world of sin and error that children are exposed to. Recently while in Africa we learned of one boy in our Remember Nhu homes who had been chained and left outside the front door of the home he had been living. For years he lived the horror of the sin and error of this dark world. But now, in a Remember Nhu home, I watched this young man running, laughing and playing football (soccer) with his friends; now Christ has appeared in a very real and tangible way in this boy's life and his soul feels it's priceless worth... a worth that is infinitely more than a commodity to be chained and sold.

He, along with us, are rejoicing... for yonder breaks a new and glorious morn for all of us who receive Jesus as Lord and Savior. We are rejoicing not only of the freedom in this world but freedom for eternity through the Word becoming flesh and moving into our lives. Would you rejoice with us... for even though there is sin and evil pining we have the thrill of hope for yonder breaks a new and glorious morning.

A thrill of hope... the weary world rejoices!

• 100 homes! On average it takes 12 years to begin a children's home (conception, funding, acquiring land, building, identifying house parents, etc.). In 12 years, the Lord has allowed Remember Nhu to open 100 homes in 16 countries with over 2,000 children!! A one hundred fold increase.

• Africa! In early December I (Bob) was able to travel to Africa...

o We began by hosting a parenting conference in Kenya with roughly 100 house parents and high school seniors. The Lord is raising up a generation who will be a redeeming force for this nation.

• In the next five days we were able to visit over 400 children and dozens of house parents in 13 Remember Nhu homes across three countries (Kenya, Tanzania and Uganda).

o In the midst of the rejoicing, I was reminded of this weary world. I was stunned to learn that a couple tribes in one of these countries still practice child sacrifice. Because of this horror, there is a risk of child sex slavery as well. o As I visited with a pastor running his own children's home of over 40 girls, I learned he begged daily for food to give the girls at least one meal per day... a world of sin and error pining! It was then that we were both informed that Remember Nhu would be bringing this home into our ministry... we both cried tears of joy

• Our Supporters New Home ...

o A new and glorious morn is dawning as two of our supporting churches have formed a partnership to adopt Remember Nhus's most recent home in Kenya. I had the honor of visiting the home.

• Bookmarks and posters...

o I had the joy of delivering over 100 bookmarks and posters made by Josiah's and Judah's school (Oostburg Christian) and Silver Creek Reformed church.

• Board of Directors...Because of your support of our ministry we have been named to the Remember Nhu Board of Directors. Bob will be representing us in that role. We are humbled and honored by this opportunity. More news coming soon...
